Based out of the Queensland University of Technology (QUT) in Brisbane, we recruit emerging artists to our roster and provide our final-year students with the opportunity to guide all aspects of these artist's development. For example, our live events team liaises with local venues to curate live performances to promote our artists, and our artist liaisons assist artists with marketing and promotional strategies. We also have a production house of composers, sound designers, and recording engineers, and along with world-class recording facilities, we offer services such as recording. film scoring, mixing, and mastering. In addition, our house composers write for our royalty-free music library, which are downloadable at our website for anybody to use in accompanying their visual content. We collaborate with QUT's film and animation, creative writing, and visual arts departments to develop promotional assets such as a magazine, music videos, live performance videos, merchandise, album artwork, graphic design, and photography. Community is important to us, we provide opportunities for high school students to collaborate with us on producing their music for promotion and release. We created Vermilion

Magazine not only for Vermilion Records, but for you and all other music fans across Australia. Six years ago, the first issue was published alongside the founding of the university-run record label. In the six years since Vermilion Magazine and Vermilion Records were established, this magazine has featured music reviews, career advice, artist interviews and everything else there is to know about the Brisbane music scene. We don't just want to advertise our artists — we want to help you find the best places in Brisbane to come together with friends and listen to great live music.




The first sounds of 'Apple Doesn't Fall' by Glass Crow (Kaelin Stemmler) invite you in like an old friend would for a reunion at their place. The tone is set by hopeful chord structures that transform into tumbling melodies weaving between the vocals. As you listen you feel as though the instrument is sitting right in front of you, accompanying a story rather than performing. The innocently delivered, double-tracked vocals are intimate in the vein of storytellers like Elliot Smith and Bon Iver. The vocals also create an atmosphere so enchanting that you almost don't notice the themes underscoring the narrative. Lines like "Pour me a drink of double standards" and "With all these selfentitled assholes running around we'll soon find out" connect with listeners as covertly shared experiences.

The track will make you smile at its wittiness and then hug you with warm, open harmonies that emerge from the refrain. Synth lines peek out from behind the vocals, contributing to the sweet familiarity of the chorus. As it unfolds, you're taken on a meandering journey that builds to a colourful instrumental bridge. It sweeps you into whimsical production and dreamy chords that veer away from the song's key before returning to the melodic

passages of the verse.

As the final chorus ends, a buoyant synth melody and whistle carry through the uplifting atmosphere of the track while cheekily reminding you of the message. In its closing moments beautiful vocal textures swell and dissipate, abandoning the cheerful tempo of the previous sections for a more haunting and contemplative atmosphere; a breath for you to reflect. With his debut single, Glass Crow manages to lay his exasperation on a backdrop of playful innocence, balancing his frustrations with enchanting instrumentation, textures, and delivery for a delightfully irreverent outcome.

THE FUNNY JIMS



Suitcase Records is breaking barriers as Brisbane's only vinyl pressing plant. Family-owned and community-focused, Suitcase Records was established in September of 2022. Just having celebrated their first birthday, they are truly making a name for themselves in the Brisbane music industry. With strong values of accessibility, support, and sustainability, there isn't much not to like about them!

This vinyl press is not your typical corporate run business; it's a labour of love for music and is a testament to the bonds that can be made through it. Musicians — both emerging and seasoned — have found a welcoming environment where their creative visions can be transformed into tangible, sellable records. Suitcase Records have made it their mission to break down barriers for independent artists who thought that producing their music onto vinyl was impossible. In the modern day of streaming, selling physical merch such as vinyl is the largest way for artists to make an income and create a meaningful connection with their fans.

The importance of mental health is also a pride of Suitcase Records, as they have recently started working

with Stepping Stone. Stepping Stone is a community-based organisation that addresses the impact of mental health and focuses on aiding in the recovery process. Suitcase Records have partnered with Stepping Stone to help get those effected by mental illness back into the workforce by providing the opportunity to work at their vinyl pressing plant.

Sustainability is also a core part of the company's ethos. In the current day, reducing waste is at the forefront of many people's minds. The vinyl pressing process inherently produces waste, but the Suitcase Records team has created a way to minimize this. They recycle excess vinyl by making coasters and they use eco-friendly packaging for their records.

Suitcase Records is a testament to what can be done with the right intent. They have created an accessible, sustainable, do-good environment for emerging independent artists, as well as those seasoned musicians. In a world that is often too fast-paced, Suitcase Records is a reminder that success is not only about profit but also about making a positive difference and leaving a legacy.



Extraverted, honest, hardworking, and with high self-esteem, you use music as a way to regulate your mood so if you're sad you'll listen to some upbeat hits (Mr Worldwide perhaps?) to perk up. However, you are nervous, turbulent, and lack creativity. Studies show that you

are also more conscientious, agreeable, conservative, and less open to new experiences. But at least you can hang your uncreative hat on the fact that your personality stands out from the rest of the genres (apart from metal fans who we'll talk about later).

Rap

Just like pop fans, rap fans are extraverted, energetic, and like to party. You have high self-esteem and are the most personality driven genre. However, unfortunately you tend to blurt out thoughts as soon as they form and apparently, you aren't very eco-friendly.

Rock

Depending on the type of rock music you like, your personality varies. So, if you like classic rock then you're a hard worker, at ease with yourself, and very nostalgic. If indie rock is more your thing, then you're lazy, have a lower self-esteem, but are very creative. And if you're into punk rock then you're intense, energetic, and low on empathy. In general, rock fans are intuitive and relaxed but are more self-centred than other listeners. You value excitement and courage and, just like pop fans, you tend to use music to regulate your mood.

R&B

If you like R&B, chances are that you're outgoing, have no problems showing your emotions, and you truly follow your heart. Apparently, you aren't interested in green energy and don't mind the current use of fossil fuel.

Jazz, Folk, Soul, & Blues

You are open-minded, creative, and reflective. You tend to use music as a way to exercise your brain but often forget to exercise your body. You're extraverted, intelligent, at ease with yourself, and have high self-esteem. It is also more likely that you are politically liberal and have greater access to financial resources. You have an active imagination, value aesthetic experiences, and view yourself as intelligent. If you're a fan of any of these genres, then chances are that you are a highly intuitive person as well.

Metal

As I mentioned before, metal fans are the only other genre besides pop fans that have a personality that stands out from the rest, but metal fans stand out in an entirely different way to pop fans. You are introverted, intuitive, gentle, and creative, quite the opposite to the rough and rowdy stereotype.

Interestingly, music psychologist Adrian North says that metal fans are just a younger version of classical music fans.

Classical

Speaking of classical music fans, you have a lot to be proud of. Along with being intuitive and having a healthy amount of self-esteem, you are usually smarter than other music lovers and you view yourself as being intelligent (this phenomenon is known as "The Mozart Effect"). And as if being smarter wasn't enough, you also tend to make more money than fans of other genres and have greater access to financial resources. Your creative mind loves complex symphonies and compositions and sees music listening as a theatrical experience, much like metal fans do. You are thought to value comfort, beauty, intellect, and love. You have an active imagination, are highly intuitive, and are eco-friendly. Interestingly, a 1989 study by Zillmann & Bhatia found that men considered women who expressed interest in classical music as more attractive and sophisticated than women who expressed a preference for heavy metal.

AN ALLMAI PERSPECTIVE

What have you been up to since your Vermilion days?

I'm releasing my first EP, 'Trial,' on the 3rd of November, which I'm launching at The Junk Bar on the 5th of November. It's been a project I've been working on since 2020. But, in between Vermilion and today, I think last year was a lot about experimenting with music. I did a lot of collaborating with electronic artists such as Phameon. I did a lot of shows and wrote a lot of music with him. I think last year I kind of went through an identity crisis with my music and went through some significant life changes. So, I kind of just experimented with the music and explored electronic music. It was a really interesting time to experiment with that genre and to see where I can go with music. I saw a lot of opportunities with co-writing music for others and producing my own music. I have seen versions of my music going towards ethereal, sub-electronic folk-esque styles. I also did some collaborations with Capre, and we've got a single coming out next year, so it's really exciting. Then I did some performances for another electronic artist called Trace Decay, who I met through Phameon last year — I'd go on stage for him and sing one of his songs... he also played bass in my band for a bit either.

How about this year? Are you working with a band?

I've been testing out different musicians; it's really important to get the right vibe. Actually, thanks to Vermilion connections, I had my first band formed for my music, and they were a very, very good band. This year, I now have a different band that supports my music; they are also a very good band.

I'm lucky to know a great community of musicians to perform my music live with.

Thanks to COVID forcing me to think of other ways I can perform, I also like having a rehearsed duo and trio performance in case performing with a band for a show isn't financially feasible.

What are the challenges for trying to make it as a musician?

I think performing music in Australia is already a huge difficulty because of its large landmass and there are only 3 main cities on the east coast, to go to before traveling 5 hours to the west coast; touring just isn't financially feasible at the moment unless you're an A-grade artist.

The next challenge is finding your own authenticity in a very dense market, as we all know—if you're putting out music, and you're not marketing your music, you're kind of just essentially throwing it into an endless sea of other new music. Not marketing your music, and not marketing authentically loses the potential for your music to be seen and heard. AND then there is TikTok, which is the most common platform where new artists are being discovered, which requires artists to create authentic content that ties their music with the brand and their brand with their audience. Successful artists that are getting discovered have a really strong online presence; they have trust with their audience and they have very clear brand pillars.

What advice would you have for emerging artists?

If it's not fun, don't do it; my mentor told me that last week, and it's great advice. At the end of the day, the music is the most important thing. Don't quit your day job; it's important to have a stable income, make good music, collaborate, meet other musicians, get to know your music lecturers and try out other creative projects that will exercise and grow your music skills."

The Music House is the allencompassing name for a few students in Vermilion Records taking on the prompt work from other Arts projects. The prompts presented to the students range from short opening jingles and intro themes to full orchestral scores, synth pieces, vlog music, and beyond. The students in the Music House strive to provide what is requested of them to the highest standard they can.

Last semester the Music House produced a library of over 100 samples of music and are continuing to expand the collection. The Music House Library has a unique property that sets it apart from other royalty free sound libraries: the ability to contact the composer of any given track. It is our hope that these connections lead to future collaborations beyond the scope of Vermilion.
